GRANT APPLICATION PROCESS

- Report every 12 months until project is complete

Welcome to Rotary grants! As Rotary members, we contribute our skills, expertise, and resources to solve some of the world's most serious problems. From providing clean water in local communities to promoting peace worldwide, Rotary grants can bring your project ideas to life.

Use the Rotary grants tool to apply for a grant, track its progress, report on it, and search for other grants in your district.

Types of grants

The Rotary Foundation offers grants that support humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. Here's an overview:

Global grants support large international projects with long-term, sustainable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. They range from \$15,000 to \$200,000.

District grants fund smaller-scale, short-term projects that address immediate needs in your community or abroad.

Packaged grants fund up to 10 scholarships each year for students in a master's program on water and sanitation at the UNESCO-IHE Institute for Water Education in Delft, Netherlands.

District qualification

Before applying for grants, district leaders agree to follow the stewardship requirements listed in the memorandum of understanding.

Grant Title: Cervical Cancer Prevention Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

The Prospect/Goshen Rotary Club of Louisville, Kentucky ("P/G"), the Les Cayes Rotary Club of Les Cayes, Haiti ("LCRC"), and CapraCare, Inc., a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization founded by and run by Haitians ("CapraCare") want to improve the quality of life and health care for the women and children in the Greater Fonfrede Area, which includes both Fonfrede and Les Cayes, Haiti. We plan to reach this goal by a) expanding CapraCare's existing programs to include outreach, educational and support programs related to preventative health care for women and children, with a focus on cervical cancer; b) training personnel to implement and then implementing the See & Treat method of detecting and treating cervical cancer in its precancerous state while it is still treatable, thereby lowering the overall incidence of cervical cancer in the area; c) seeking to obtain and then introducing to pre-teens the vaccine for the HPV virus that causes cervical cancer, eventually leading to the elimination of cervical cancer in the area; and d) employing or using the services of the individuals in the area to fill the roles necessary to help us achieve this goal (collectively, the 'Project').

Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

In November, 2014, P/G contacted CapraCare at the suggestion of a mutual contact who was familiar with CapraCare's long term goal of expanding it menu of preventative health services to women in the Greater Fonfrede Area. Rotarians from P/G spoke with CapraCare's founder and Executive Director, Jean Pierre Louis, during the month of December several times to become familiar with what CapraCare did and hoped to do in the future; CapraCare became familiar with the See &

Treat method and consulted with Dr. Steven Papillon in Port au Prince about the need for preventative health care related to cervical cancer in Haiti in general and the Greater Fonfrede Area in particular. Mr. Louis also talked with Jean Yves Olivier, a member of LCRC about this need and the interest of LCRC in working with CapraCare and P/G on this project. In January, 2015, Mr. Louis came to Louisville, Kentucky, the home of P/G, for two days to meet with P/G and educate P/G further about the status of preventative health services for women and children in the Greater Fonfrede Area.

In February, Dr. Muriel Harris, a member of P/G, went to Fonfrede to visit CapraCare's existing community health center so as to become more familiar with CapraCare's operation on the ground, to attend focus groups and to visit with LCRC. After this

visit and additional conversations, all parties decided that P/G's and LCRC's desire to help end cervical cancer in Haiti and CapraCare's desire to add preventative health care for women was a good fit for PG, LCRC and CapraCare to work together on the Project.

CapraCare, which was founded by Haitians and is run by Haitians, already operates a small community health center. It already is involved in the community through its outreach and education programs about wellness and through its

preventative health services for children. Dr. Papillon provides medical expertise in providing health care to Haitians as well as working with the Haitian Ministry of Health. Mr. Louis, a native of Fonfrede, has a degree in public health and is already familiar with the challenges and opportunities in running and supporting CapraCare. Mr. Louis has knowledge and experience in working with and organizing groups, educational institutions and other organizations to come to the Greater Fonfrede Area to provide preventative health care services for children. Dr. Papillon and Mr. Louis have already provided a wealth of information about the culture as well as the requirements to provide health services in Haiti.

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

Dr. Muriel Harris, a professor at the University of Louisville in the area of Public Health, will consult with the Project Prevention Director, the Project Data Manager, trainers and liaisons as well as the members of the LesCayes Rotary Club regarding the status, implementation and success of the various programs, offering suggestions and advice and counsel as needed.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

As shared by CapraCare with our Rotary Club and as documented in the December 15, 2014 Fact Sheet issued by the ICO Information Center on 'HPV and Cancer, Human Papillomavirus and Related Cancers,' Haiti has one of the highest reported incidence of cervical cancer of any country in the world, with 94 cases per 100,000 population. Haiti has a population of 3.45 million women ages 15 years and older who are at risk of contracting the HPV virus which causes cervical cancer. Cervical

cancer is the leading cause of cancer death in Haitian women with an estimated 1,500 deaths annually. Most women in Haiti, including the women of the Greater Fonfrede Area, have never been screened for cervical cancer as there are no pap smears--and no money to pay for them. As witnessed by CapraCare and attested to by Dr. Steve Papillon in his aforementioned attached letter, women and children in this area face many individual, social, and environmental barriers to accessing care,

prevention and supportive services due to lack of access, unemployment, low or no education, stigma and other basic needs.

How did your project team identify these needs?

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

How were community members involved in planning the project?

CapraCare was interested in expanding its menu of preventative health services to include preventative care for women. Through a mutual contact, CapraCare learned that P/G was interested in working with organizations in Haiti to end cervical cancer there and so reached out to PG; CapraCare then reached out to LCRC who expressed an interest in helping CapraCare and P/G to achieve this goal.

In February, 2015, Capra Care held a series of focus groups/educational forums, attended by Dr. Muriel Harris, a member of PG, to determine if the women and children of the Greater Fonfrede Area would avail themselves of such services. The overwhelming response was yes. Since that time, CapraCare, LCRC and P/G have worked to develop this Project. As

CapraCare is the only provider of any kind of health services in Fonfrede, and with the implementation of this Project, will be the only provider in the Greater Fonfrede area of the See & Treat method and HPV vaccine, this Project fulfills CapraCare's initiative to provide better preventative health care for women and children in this area.

Legal agreement

In consideration of receiving this global grant from The Rotary Foundation (TRF), the Sponsors acknowledge and agree that:

- The Sponsors have each received and read a copy of the Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation
 District Grants and Global Grants, which are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement and
 will abide by all terms and conditions set forth therein.
- The total financing amount of this Agreement is the U.S. dollar amount listed in the grant announcement letter. Any amount received in excess of the approved grant contributions will automatically be counted as general irrevocable giving to TRF and will not be applied to the global grant.
- 3. All global grant funds provided by TRF shall not be used for any purposes other than those approved by TRF. TRF shall be entitled to receive reimbursement for any and all global grant funds deposited with, held by, or otherwise contributed to either or both of the Sponsors that are spent for unapproved purposes as well as any funds used to benefit a Rotarian or Rotary entity. In addition, TRF reserves the right to audit the grant's financial activities at any time and suspend any or all payments if in its sole discretion progress is not considered to be satisfactory.
- 4. The Sponsors will keep TRF informed on the grant's progress by submitting progress reports every twelve months during the implementation of the grant activities. The Sponsors will immediately inform TRF of any significant problems with the implementation of the grant or deviations from the planned activities, including deviations in the budget. The Sponsors will submit the final report with complete financial accounting within two months of the grant's completion.
- 5. The Sponsors shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Rotary International (RI) and TRF, including their directors, trustees, officers, committees, employees, agents, associate foundations and representatives (collectively "RI/TRF"), from and against all claims, including but not limited to claims of subrogation, demands, actions, damages, losses, costs, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees and other legal expenses), awards, judgments, and fines asserted against or recovered from RI/TRF arising out of any act, conduct, omission, negligence, misconduct, or unlawful act (or act contrary to any applicable governmental order or regulation) resulting directly or indirectly from a Sponsor's and/or participant's involvement in grant-funded activities, including all travel related to the grant.
- RI/TRF's entire responsibility is expressly limited to payment of the total financing amount. Neither RI nor TRF assumes any further responsibility in connection with this grant. Neither RI nor TRF is responsible for unfunded travelers.
- 7. TRF reserves the right to cancel this Agreement without notice upon the failure of either or both of the Sponsors to abide by terms set forth in this Agreement and the Terms and Conditions for District Grants and Global Grants. Upon cancellation, TRF shall be entitled to a refund of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended.
- 8. The failure of the Parties to comply with the terms of this Agreement due to an act of God, strike, war, fire, riot, civil unrest, hurricane, earthquake, or other natural disasters, acts of public enemies, curtailment of transportation facilities, political upheavals, acts of terrorism, or any reason beyond the reasonable control of the Parties shall not be deemed a breach of this Agreement. In such an event, the Agreement shall be deemed terminated and Sponsors shall refund all unexpended global grant funds within 30 days of termination.
