Today we will have a Fellowship Meeting with Rotarian Dr. Beverley Agard speaking on "Our Health Matters." Our Greeters are Past President and Past Assistant Governor, Dr. Grenville Phillips and Past Director Trevor Gordon Fields.

MEET OUR GREETERS

Dr. Grenville W. Phillips, CBE, was granted this honour in the Queen's New Year Honours List for 2000. He was recognized for public service and services to accountancy.

He joined the Club on May 01, 1976 and his Classification is Business Services - Consultancy. He served as President for the year 1986-1987, which was the 25th Anniversary of Rotary in Barbados. It is said that he reported to the Club that "due to a lack of funds there will be no designated Presidential Project;" however the Club recognized twenty-five (25) persons who



made a difference to the Community (recognizing Vocations).

Also during this time the first pace-maker was donated to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital; a program which still continues thorough Heartbeat International. PP Grenville has served the Club as secretary 1977-1979 and the District as Assistant Governor 2010-2012.

He was awarded the Paul Harris Fellowship in 2006. He currently serves on the President's Council and the Rotary Foundation Committee

Past Community Service Director Trevor Gordon Fields has along with

Our Guest Speaker, Ms. Kay Sargeant, Education Officer responsible for Nursery and Primary Schools

gave A brief look into Dyslexia. She was introduced by Chair Tracey.

Ms Sargeant reiterated the point that more need to be done to nationally manage all aspects of Dyslexia. This included the early detection, teacher training and support for parents.



Further she indicated that there "was no cure" for Dyslexia. Testing should be from age seven. More importantly she cautioned that persons "suffering" from Dyslexia were in cases above average intelligence.

She challenged the Club that it is a worthwhile cause to be championed.

Gifts placed under that tree will go to children of prison inmates.

REMEMBERING NOVEMBER 30, 1979

A true show of unity—Maurice Foster

IT WAS A DAY when the Rotary Club of Barbados joined forces with Barbadians and in true unity formed what became known as Barbados' biggest day.

The date was November 30,1979, and the number of persons joining hands across the nation amounted to 93 111. The aim of the human link was to show the world the care Barbadians felt for children during the International Year of the Child.

The Barbados National Chain Link brought together the rich, the poor, the young and the old, the Barbadian and the visitor in a unique display of oneness never before attempted on such a large scale.

Here, in an edited version, former Rotarian Maurice Foster writes about his involvement in this national event which was the brainchild of then 25-year-old Rotarian, Paul Hadchity.

I WAS ASKED by Randall Goddard to attend a meeting at Kensington House, Fontabelle, St Michael, to hear about an idea that Paul Hadchity had proposed to the Rotary Club of Barbados. His idea was to form a human chain link around Barbados on Independence Day, November 30, 1979.

Paul Hadchity is perhaps the most creative person that I know and we have become good friends.

The Chain, which would comprise mainly school children, was also to commemorate the International Year of The Child. I thought it was a great idea, especially as at that time Grenada was going Communist and it seemed to be a great way to inspire Barbadians to join together, and to show the rest of the world that we loved Barbados and had no intention of letting anybody or any communist system take over the island.

I was to discover that Paul's capacity to dream big dreams for Barbados would exceed even the Chain Link. His plan to take tourism to whatever level the infrastructure of Barbados could support may still become a reality.
