TOP 5 REASONS TO ERADICATE POLIO

1

To improve lives.

16 million people are walking today who would have otherwise been paralyzed.

2

To invest in the future.

If polio isn't eradicated, within 10 years, as many as 200,000 children could be paralyzed by it each year. A polio-free world will be a safer world for children everywhere.

3

To improve child health.

Polio surveillance networks and vaccination campaigns also monitor children for other health problems like vitamin deficiency and measles, so they can be addressed sooner.

4

To save money.

A polio-free world will save the global economy \$40-\$50 billion in health costs within the next 20 years.

5

To make history.

Polio eradication would be one of history's greatest public health achievements, with polio following smallpox to become only the second human disease eliminated from the world.



DISTRICT 7030 RYLA

This year there will be no D7030 RYLA. The decision is NOT to have a District RYLA, but a more local RYLA.

The considerations that have led to this decision are the following:

1. The organization of a District RYLA is not easy and requires a lot of effort: think about financial, accommodation and logistics challenges.
2. A District RYLA will incur costs, both for the organizing country and the participants. For non-local participants, these are the registration and accommodation costs and the travel expenses. An average budget of at least USD 1000 per foreign participant is normal. In addition, travel within our district is often very time consuming.
3. In recent years, apparently because of the above-mentioned expenses and challenges, the participation of certain countries appears to be very limited and sometimes not at all.
4. The purpose of each organization is to have as many participants as possible at their event. Above all, since RYLA is a training event, a District RYLA should be able to attract maximum participation from all countries in the district to have maximum impact.
5. A low participation of countries in the district is detrimental to the international and district character and experience of such a RYLA.
6. Having impact on a larger scale is more important than international experience for a few.

If we join forces to have RYLA 's organized on a smaller geographical scale, by areas (Trinidad and Tobago), by country, or a cluster of countries which are situated relatively close to each other (Guadeloupe, Martinique, St. Lucia) we will have a much bigger impact by having trained many more.

ORGANIZE A RYLA EVENT

What is RYLA?

RYLA is a leadership development program that is organized at the club, district, or multidistrict level. The format of your event depends on what you hope to accomplish, your resources, and your audience – it could be a one-day seminar, a three-day retreat, or a weeklong camp.

While participants can be any age, most events focus on secondary school students, university students, or young adults. You can use RYLA to engage at-risk youth, motivate Interact or Rotaract club officers, reconnect with Rotary alumni, or mentor young professionals to become responsible leaders.






